MEMORANDUM FOR Picatinny Arsenal Resident Military Families

SUBJECT: Picatinny Arsenal Child Supervision Policy

1. **PURPOSE:** To provide guidelines for supervision of children at Picatinny Arsenal, NJ.
2. **REFERENCES:**
 - a. AR 608-18, Army Family Advocacy Program, Oct 07.
 - b. AR 608-10, Child Development Services, Jul 97.
 - c. Memorandum, HQ CFSC-CYS, July 00, subject: Out of School Child Supervision Requirements for Elementary and Middle School Children and Youth During Parental Duty Hours.
 - d. Department of Defense Instruction (DODI) 6060.3, School- Age Care Program, Dec 96.
3. **APPLICABILITY:** This policy applies to all Military Residents at Picatinny Arsenal, NJ.
4. **BACKGROUND:**
 - a. While realizing that safeguarding children is primarily a parental responsibility DoD requires each installation to develop a child supervision policy that offers guidelines for parents and the community to achieve this task. Parents also need to carefully evaluate the age and maturity of their child before making the decision as to whether their child is capable of self-care or caring for younger children. To ensure that parents are meeting their obligation as a parent, the four-step evaluation at Appendix A has been established.
 - b. Department of the Army offers guidelines for establishing this policy, including creation of an installation team to develop a local policy that best meets the needs of Picatinny Arsenal.
5. **POLICY:**
 - a. Picatinny Arsenal's guidelines for the supervision of minor children are based on the child's age and grade in school. The enclosed Table 1 explains the level of supervision required for children and specifies the following:

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(1) Children in the fourth grade and below require supervision at all times.

(2) Children in the fifth grade and who are 10 years old may be left home alone occasionally for up to 3 hours, but not on a daily basis.

(3) Children in the sixth grade and above may be left home alone. Children in these grades may also babysit younger siblings. The completion of a babysitting course is highly recommended. They must have ready access to adult supervision.

(4) Children 13 years and older may babysit children other than siblings. A babysitting course is highly recommended.

b. Table 2 provides conversions of ages to grades for home- schooled children.

6. RESPONSIBILITIES:


a. Military and DoD civilian sponsors are responsible at all times for the supervision, health, safety and welfare of their family members and guests on the installation. Deliberate failure to provide for adequate and reasonable care of minor children may result in adverse consequences for the sponsor. These consequences may include, but are not limited to, criminal prosecution, civil liability, and/or termination of housing privileges on the installation.

b. Child and Youth and School Services (CYSS) will maintain a referral list of registered babysitters who are thirteen and older and who have completed the babysitting course.

c. CYSS will maintain a resource list of activities both on and off the installation that are available options for supervision.

d. Every member of the Picatinny Arsenal Community is responsible for maintaining the highest possible safety standards. Each member should report information regarding known or suspected incidents of child abuse, neglect or maltreatment. This is a matter of conscience and good faith and should be taken seriously. ¹ Indirect supervision plans include mandated checking in with a neighbor, emergency phone numbers of parents and emergency medical power of attorney.

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4 Steps parents will use in determining whether their child is able to provide self care or care for other children.

Step 1: Your child must know the following:

1. Self-identifying information: Your child needs to know this information if lost, in danger, or trying to get the police or fire department to the home. Remember--some homes are difficult to locate:

- Full name
- Complete address and directions from a main road to the home
- Phone number

2. Location of important phone numbers: These numbers should be posted directly by the telephone. Your child must always have someone to call in an emergency situation.

- All Emergencies (Police, Fire, and Medical): Dial 911
- Parent's phone numbers (work, etc.)
- Back-up person to call in case of emergency (neighbor, etc.)

3. How to use the telephone:

- Your child must be able to operate the telephone
- Your child should know how to call the operator and why
- Your child should know what to say when someone asks if his/her parents are home

4. Locks and keys: If your child carries a key to your home, make sure it is not visible. Children wearing a key around their neck is a sure sign that they let themselves into the house. This makes them vulnerable to strangers.

- Your child should be able to lock and unlock the door to your home from the inside
- Your child should be able to gain entry to your home

Step 2: Your child must be able to respond to the following:

1. What to do in case of fire - Call 911.
2. What to do if injured - Call 911.
3. If cooking on the stove is permitted, what to do in case of a cooking accident - Call 911.
4. Must know the perimeters of "outside" play in the housing area.
5. What to do/say if a stranger approaches.
6. What to do if the electricity goes off in the home.

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7. Call you at once after arriving at home from school.
8. There must be guidelines if your child is allowed to leave the home and visit friends or have friends over.

Step 3: If your child is caring for younger siblings (brothers/sisters), at a minimum the following guidelines should be established and enforced:

1. Authority must be given to one child to act as the leader. The other children will accept this leadership and obey accordingly.
2. A form of discipline will be established between children to maintain order. The form of discipline will be safe.
3. Your children will get along with each other when you are not present.
4. An adult point of contact is available for emergencies.

Note: If infants are involved, strict guidelines for care must be specifically established and understood.

Step 4: The following situations need to be addressed by parents to determine if their child is mature enough to stay home without supervision:

1. Is your child afraid to stay home alone?
2. Does your child play with fire or dangerous objects?
3. Does your child have a history of uncontrolled seizures, black outs, or violent, aggressive behavior?
4. Does your child have a handicap that requires special care and supervision?
5. Are you inaccessible by phone?
6. Does your child go easily to strangers?
